Elevible Pregram Design

As adult learners, teachers have differing needs, interests, and time available for study. Flexible program design is attractive to teachers because it allows them to organize their study in ways that will be most beneficial to them. The CETA program designs sessions as individual workshops (three hours each) or multiple session courses (up to 30 hours). Teachers create their own personally-tailored program by selecting and linking classes and courses. Attendance records show a full range of participation, from single-session to intensive study.

Triple Content Focus

The program has a triple content focus in arts education: 1) arts integration as an approach to teaching; 2) teaching in and about the arts; and 3) helping teachers become discerning arts audiences.

1) Arts Integration as an Approach to Teaching

Arts integration workshops and courses help teachers learn ways to help students construct and demonstrate their understanding through arts modalities. By engaging students in the creative process that connects an art form with another subject area, teachers help students meet in-depth objectives in both. These sessions provide exemplary mutually-

Teachers are busy and often overworked. When they give their time to professional learning opportunities they expect that time to be well spent. Teachers expect instructors to be prepared and well informed, and to offer ideas

Teacher Recognition

Teachers who continue their education in the arts are recognized by the Kennedy Center. Teachers earn CETA Certificates of Study for successfully completing each 30 hours of study and assignments. Certificates are presented at an awards ceremony each spring.

Ongoing Formative Assessment

Ongoing formative assessment is a critical part of the development process for all workshops and courses. The assessment draws on
